

CLINTON OLDE TOWNE HISTORIC DISTRICT TO BE CONSIDERED FOR THE NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

The Clinton Olde Towne Historic District, Clinton, Hinds County, Mississippi, will be considered by the Mississippi National Register Review Board for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places at its meeting on November 17, 2016.

The Clinton Olde Towne Historic District is an irregularly shaped polygon roughly bounded on the North by the soccer field west of W. Leake Street, Vernon Road east of Warrenton Road and west of Capitol Street and Belmont Street east of Jefferson Street and west of Monroe Street, including the lots on the north side of Belmont Street between Jefferson Street and Monroe Street; on the East by East Street north of Madison Street and south of E. Lawson Street; and Clinton Parkway south of East Street and north of E. College Street; on the South by E. College Street east of Monroe Street and west of Clinton Parkway, and Madison Street west Monroe Street and east of Billie Byrd Drive, including the lots facing Madison Street on the southwest of West Street and east of W. College Street; and on the West by Billie Byrd Drive and the west boundary of the soccer fields and the west lot lines of the lots facing Capitol Street on the west, north of W. Lawson Street. The National Register of Historic Places is the country's official list of buildings, sites, districts, and structures that merit preservation because of their significance in American history. Listing in the National Register results in the following for historic properties:

1. Consideration in planning for Federal, federally licensed, and federally assisted projects. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation must be given an opportunity to comment on all federally related projects affecting listed properties. For further information see 36 CFR 800.
2. Eligibility for Federal tax provisions. The Federal Internal Revenue Code encourages the preservation of depreciable historic structures by allowing favorable tax treatments for rehabilitation and also provides for charitable contributions for conservation purposes of partial interests in historically important land areas or structures. For further information see 36 CFR 67.
3. Eligibility for state tax credits. In March 2006, Governor Haley Barbour signed Senate Bill 3067, which created the Mississippi state historic preservation tax incentives program to encourage the rehabilitation of historic buildings. For further information, contact the

4. Consideration of historic values in the decision by the State or Federal government to issue a surface coal mining permit where coal is located. For further information see 30 CFR 700 et seq.

5. Eligibility for Federal grants-in-aid, whenever funds are appropriated by Congress. For further information contact Kenneth H. P'Pool, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer.

Owners of private property nominated to the National Register may concur in or object to the nomination in accord with 36 CFR 60. Any owner or partial owner who objects to listing should submit a notarized statement (certifying ownership and objection to listing) to Kenneth H. P'Pool, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer, P.O. Box 571, Jackson, Mississippi 39205, before the time the Review Board reviews the nomination on November 17, 2016. Each owner or partial owner has one vote, regardless of how many whole or partial properties in the district are owned by that party. If a majority of private property owners object to the nomination, it will not be listed; however, the State Historic Preservation Officer shall submit the nomination to the Keeper of the National Register for a determination of eligibility for inclusion in the National Register. If the property is determined eligible but not formally listed, the Advisory Council must still be given an opportunity to comment on Federal projects which may affect the district.
